

About the photo exhibition and lecture about the Kingdom of Cambodia at Ashiya University

At the incorporated educational institution Ashiya Academy and the premises of the Ashiya University a photo exhibition about the Kingdom of Cambodia and a lecture from Hideo Yamada, honorary consul of the Kingdom of Cambodia in Osaka, were held on behalf of the development of the Kingdom of Cambodia and the Ashiya University from now on.

Special lecture “ The future of Cambodia by Consul of Honor of the Kingdom of Cambodia Hideo Yamada” as part of the course “General Introduction to Political Measures”

Lecturer: Hideo Yamada, honorary consul of the Kingdom of Cambodia in Osaka

- In 1953 Cambodia separated itself from France and started first diplomatic relations with Japan. Until today the corporative relationship between both countries continues. In the past, the relationship developed through projects to stop the inflation rate or the PKO (peacekeeping operations). Nowadays, Consul Yamada's aim is to develop the tourism and economy of Cambodia further and to secure its diplomatic relations as well as the domestic security.
- As an example for the volunteer work done in Cambodia an Art-Therapist of NHCC (New Hope for Cambodian Children) talked about her experiences with Cambodian children and emphasized the importance of further volunteer work in Cambodia.
- The possibilities of internships or volunteer work in Cambodia were explained to the students and the lecture ended with the remark, that there is still a lot that we can do to make life in Cambodia a better one.
